Figures above do not include the provision of forensic medical examinations at SARC, as this service is part of a much wider healthcare in custody contract.

Waiting lists

SARC is provided 24/7 with no waiting list. Waiting lists for counselling are held in response to increased demand for support. Additional PCC funding has been allocated to increase the capacity of specialist SV services to respond to demand. Further discussions are ongoing with health commissioners about mental health services.

Day to day waiting lists are managed by providers. Survivors are supported whilst they are on the waiting list. Depending on the survivor's wishes and the provider's service offer this might be accessing group therapeutic support, accessing short term (telephone) counselling or providers keeping in touch with survivors via regular phone calls. Alternatively providers can refer to mainstream mental health services, which also support survivors of sexual violence.
