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1. Legislation

Pensions Act 2014 has received Royal Assent.

The Act contains a range of provisions to implement.

Defence Reform Act 2014 has received Royal Assent.

This act enables the MOD to deliver better value for money for the taxpayer and to make the armed forces better able to meet the challenges of tomorrow.

Immigration Act 2014 has received Royal Assent.

The Immigration Bill has received Royal Assent making way for a series of reforms which will ensure our immigration system is fairer to British citizens and legitimate migrants and tougher on those with no right to be here. The Immigration Act 2014 contains 77 clauses and makes fundamental changes to how our immigration system functions.

Care Act 2014 has received Royal Assent.

Police Reform and Social Responsibility Act 2011 Amendments

The Police Reform and Social Responsibility Act, which has been updated to reflect the latest amendments.

Anti-social Behaviour, Crime and Policing Act 2014 overarching documents

These documents contain some updates from when they were last published. They include a schedule of when the various sections of the Act are being implemented.

Community Trigger commencement date

Following discussion with the Home Office there is confirmation that a commencement date of 13th May has been announced for the Community Trigger and Community Remedy. This is an administrative process that allows you to begin the consultation needed to prepare for these two powers. You do not have to have them in place by this date, or publish any

processes by this date. Both tools will commence at the same time as the rest of the tools on a date yet to be announced, but thought to be October.

Offender Rehabilitation Act 2014

It provides many of the measures which underpin the Transforming Rehabilitation programme.

The Offender Rehabilitation Act 2014 (Commencement No. 1) Order 2014

This Order is the first commencement order made under the Offender Rehabilitation Act 2014 (c.11) ("the Act"). This Order commences a number of provisions of the Act on 1st June 2014.

The Home Office has published a circular highlighting revisions to two of the codes of practice, issued under the Police and Criminal Evidence Act 1984 (PACE) - codes C and H.

Government announces support aimed at 16-17-year-old NEETS

For the first time ever DWP, in partnership with local authorities, will implement a new approach that focuses support solely on 16-17 year olds who are not in education, employment or training (NEET) and not in receipt of an income based benefit. 16 and 17-year-olds will be given access to jobcentre work coaches so that they can get individual help to find work and training, Deputy Prime Minister Nick Clegg and Employment Minister Esther McVey have announced.

All 9 regions of England see fall in 16- to 18-year-olds NEET

Skills and Enterprise Minister <u>Matthew Hancock</u> welcomed <u>new figures</u> showing the number of 16- to 18-year-olds not in education, employment or training is falling in all 9 regions of England, equating to thousands more young people in education, employment or training. The 2013 figures, drawn from data collected by local authorities, show that for 16- to 18-yearolds the number of NEETs compared to the previous year fell by:

- 19% in London
- 12% in the North West
- 9% in the North East
- 9% in the East of England

- 7% in the South East
- 5% in the South West

Policy: Keeping the UK safe in cyber space

The growth of the internet has transformed our everyday lives and is an important part of our economy. The internet-related market in the UK is now estimated to be worth £82 billion a year while British businesses earn £1 in every £5 from the internet. But with greater openness, interconnection and dependency comes greater vulnerability. <u>81% of large corporations and 60% of small businesses reported a cyber breach in 2013</u>. With the cost for the worst cyber-security breach estimated between £600,000 to £1.15 million for large businesses and £65,000 to £115,000 for smaller ones. The Strategic Defence and Security Review allocated £650 million over 4 years to establish a new National Cyber Security Programme to strengthen the UK's cyber capacity. The Chancellor of the Exchequer announced an extra £210 million investment after the <u>2013 spending review</u>.

David Sparks announced as Chair-elect after Labour confirmed as largest party in the LGA

Cllr David Sparks is to succeed Cllr <u>Sir Merrick Cockell</u> as Chairman of the Local Government Association, the body which represents councils in England and Wales.

Cut bureaucracy by merging Whitehall - LGA

The LGA has launched a ten-point plan for 'rewiring public services', with radical devolution and localisation at its heart. Sir Merrick Cockell, chairman of the LGA, announced the plan in his keynote speech at the annual conference. The report sets out guidance to improve services whilst saving money in the face of further budget cuts outlined in the Spending Review. Recommendations include merging six government departments to form a single 'England' office to reduce barriers to more efficient working.

15 councils sign up to National Social Inclusion Network

Fifteen local authorities have signed up to be part of the new National Social Inclusion Network, launched by Birmingham City Council and the Bishop of Birmingham, to tackle social inequality. <u>The declaration</u> states that, against a backdrop of public sector cuts, the task of creating more inclusive cities has moved beyond what local or national government can do on their own and that there is an urgent need to rally resources and expertise. The authorities that have signed the declaration are Barrow-in-Furness, Birmingham, Bristol, Islington, Knowsley, Leeds, Leicester, Liverpool, Manchester, Newcastle, Plymouth, Sheffield, Southampton, Stoke-on-Trent and Tower Hamlets.

Focused on eight themes, the Network's activities were identified from reports produced by fairness and poverty commissions from around the country.

4. Consultations

Tax-Free Childcare: consultation on childcare account provision

The consultation seeks views on options for the government to deliver Tax-Free Childcare itself, through National Savings and Investments (NS&I), or within HM Revenue and Customs (HMRC). This will mean all interested parties will have had an opportunity to comment on all of the options for account provision across public and private sectors. The government will consider responses to this consultation alongside the response to the previous consultation before it makes its final decision on the provision of childcare accounts. The consultation closes on 27 June 2014.

Proposed changes to guidance on domestic violence

The Director of Public Prosecutions, Alison Saunders, has proposed changes to the way the CPS considers domestic violence cases and has published draft guidance, which is out for consultation, that explains the impact of domestic abuse on different groups to help prosecutors to adopt a tailored approach taking into account their particular support needs. The consultation is open until 9th July 2014.

Public Traffic Signs consultation

The Department for Transport has launched a public consultation on proposed changes to the Traffic Signs Regulations and General Directions 2002. The consultation will close on 10 June 2014.

Schedule 7 Code of Practice

The statutory Code of Practice provides guidance to examining officers on the application and interpretation of Schedule 7. These have had to be revised code to ensure they reflect the changes introduced in the ASBCP Act. These changes will maintain the protection of the UK border as well as continuing to respect individuals' human rights. The Home Office welcomes your views on how adequately the changes in the ASBCP Act are reflected within the revised draft Code of Practice. You can respond via the <u>online survey</u>.

Review of the operation of Sections 135 and 136

The Government is reviewing the operation of Sections 135 and 136 of the Mental Health Act

Public consultation on pre-charge bail

The College of Policing in partnership with the national policing lead for criminal justice, Chief Constable Chris Eyre, is consulting on new bail principles to support police use of pre-charge bail. The consultation is open until 19th June 2014.

Public Consultation: Developing NICE guidelines: the manual

From 1 April 2014 NICE are inviting comments and feedback from stakeholders and the public on the new manual for developing NICE guidelines. Consultation closes 30 June 2014.

Sentencing guidelines for theft

The consultation on the draft guideline on theft offences is open from 3 April 2014 to 26 June 2014. The Council is seeking views on:

- the principal factors that make any of the offences included within the draft guideline more or less serious;
- the additional factors that should influence the sentence;
- the approach taken to structuring the draft guidelines;
- the types and lengths of sentences that should be passed for theft offences; and
- anything else that you think should be considered.

5. Reviews and Inspections

HMIC provides assurance that chief constables are having regard to the Strategic Policing Requirement – but finds that more needs to be done

This inspection examined how well police forces have established the arrangements that the Strategic Policing Requirement requires them to have in place to counter a number of specified threats to national security and public safety. It is based on data and documentary evidence provided by all 43 police forces in England and Wales in July 2013. It includes supporting fieldwork, conducted in 18 forces, and in nine Regional Organised Crime Units (ROCUs).
